A word From Michael

Messa di Gloria

Messa di Gloria has been chosen as the joint work for this year's Swaledale Festival with Swale Singers, and we also look forward to sharing it with audiences closer to home in our summer concerts. Giacomo Puccini is best known for his operas such as La Bohème, Tosca and Madama Butterfly. However, the young Puccini was born into a family with a long association with church music, and in many ways it was expected that he would follow in his predecessor's footsteps. Messa di Gloria was written

at the tender age of 18 as Puccini's final graduation piece at the Istituto Musicale Pacini in Lucca, performed in 1880. While it was received to great acclaim by the public and academic staff alike, the work was not heard again for 72 years, and only resurfaced in 1952 when it was brought to the public's attention by an American priest researching a biography on Puccini. That Messa di Gloria wasn't heard again in Puccini's lifetime suggests that composer had by then made up his mind to abandon his family vocation of writing music for the church, and instead compose

for the operatic stage. In this way, the work can be heard as a kind of farewell by Puccini to the world of sacred music. It is strongly operatic in style: lyrical and tuneful with many beautiful and dramatic moments, and strongly influenced by the operas of Verdi. I would strongly encourage you to find a recording of the work over the Christmas holidays and have a listen—it will hopefully be very rewarding! I am looking forward to our getting to know this little-heard piece over the next 6 months!
